Marie Jacque Kumler

"We speak of "big" men, of the "big" things they have done, but to this woman goes that adjective raised to the superlative.

Hers was the first familiar face that greeted me as I came, a stranger to Dayton over ten years ago, and this kindly act imprinted itself upon my heart and all my affection went out at that moment; an affection that has never wavered."

Mrs. Marie J. Kumler was born in Marine, Illinois in 1856. She and her mother moved to Williamsburg, Ohio when Marie was a small child. In 1879, Marie began her teaching career in Van Buren Township, near what is now Belmont. In 1881 Marie came to Dayton and was elected principal of what was then known as the Second District School, formerly located on North Perry Street.

It was while teaching at the Second District School that Marie met Charles H. Kumler, a rising young lawyer and member of the school board; they were married June 26, 1890. Though the Kumlers did not have children of their own, Marie's life's work earned her the title "Mother of Clubs".



Mrs. Kumler was one of the organizers of the Young Women's League in 1895. Contemporaries joked that the League began "with \$1.25 and three lead pencils," but grew from its humble beginnings (one room with luncheons served) to possesses one of the most valuable properties in Dayton at that time, operating one of the largest cafeterias in the city.

One of Mrs. Kumler's greatest accomplishments was the formation of the Dayton Woman's Club in 1916. A plaque honoring her contribution is displayed next to the Club's entrance (see photos below).

Acting as the Club's first president, Marie wrote that the Dayton Woman's club should act as a base for education and philanthropy—its premises serving "as a meeting place for music, art and study clubs and circles composed of women or of men and women." It should also be an "open forum for the presentation and discussion of all subjects pertaining to educational, civic or social improvements and for a social center for women."

John H. Patterson advised his sister, Julia, (one of the club's founding members) that the organization should look into purchasing a mansion that was still in good shape after the 1913 Flood to use for a headquarters.

To finance the purchase of their building, Marie Kumler led a stock-selling drive; raising the \$5,000 down payment needed to secure a home for the Dayton Woman's club.

The organization still exists today at 225 North Ludlow Street, and is open to the public Mondays through Fridays 9am-4pm.

For several years preceding her death, Marie J. Kumler served as Ohio's Chairman of Industrial Relations in the State Federation of Women's Clubs. This work allowed Marie to help connect a variety of Ohio's women's clubs—enabling organizations to communicate directly and support each other in furtherance of their goals.

The Margaret club, a boarding home for "business girls" at 509 West Second Street, occupied a special place in Mrs. Kumler's heart. Organized in 1910, the club was revolutionary for its time; by offering room & board on a sliding scale, the Margaret club allowed young businesswomen a freedom otherwise hard to come by in that era. Marie Kumler would serve as club president until her death at age 68 in June, 1925.






