# **April Tours & More!**








#### Classic Historic Tour:




## The Daytonians:


## Lydia Huffman

1779-1865

After service one Sabbath morning, Mrs. Lydia Huffman was baptized in the Miami river, a little to the east of the present site of the Main Street bridge. It was the first baptism, so far as known, ever witnessed in Dayton.

#### Anna & Jacob Bosler

Dr. Jacob Bosler, after a practice of twenty-five years as a regular physician, became a convert to homeopathy in 1849, and followed that system of practice the rest of his life.

#### Joseph Wheeler

1796-1871

Born in Halifax County, Virginia in 1795, Wheeler was emancipated in 1805 and moved to Dayton in 1824. He married Catherine Sells, and their descendants have "played a significant role in Dayton's history in the areas of law enforcement, the preservation of local black history, music and community/fraternal organizations," according to "Dayton's African American History" by historian Margaret E. Peters.



#### Jane & Nathaniel Wilson

1800-1874 & 1791-1849

Jane, daughter of George and Mary Newcom, was born in Dayton on April 14, 1800, at her father's tavern, on the corner of Main Street and Monument Avenue. She was married in 1819 to Nathaniel Wilson, a respected early pioneer in Dayton. He was one of the first school directors of the city and served as treasurer beginning in 1840. He was also a member of the Grand Jury that indicted accused murderer John McAfee. McAfee was ultimately found guilty and hanged at the edge of town.

Not into public speaking? Consider getting involved with our horticulture team, or assisting with special events & research projects.






